Editor's Note: During the NASA 2009 Silver Jubilee festivities, Kartik Subbarao presented information about the Sankethi Family Tree project. The session was very well-attended, and the information shared was of interest to many members. In follow-up to his presentation, Kartik was requested to share a few words for this edition of Chiguru.

Have you ever wanted to trace your roots back to your great-grandmothers, great-grandfathers and beyond? Have you wanted to see just exactly how you are related to any other Sankethi, past or present? With over 2900 people currently populated and more being added on a regular basis, the Sankethi Family Tree gives our community the potential to do just that. Check it out at http://sankethi.ourroots.info. Try searching for yourself and see if your information is up to date. If not, please contact sankethi.family_tree-owner@yahoogroups.com and we'll be happy to add/update it. Better yet, if you'd like to help contribute to the family tree, we can add you as an editor so that you can update information directly.

As you browse and search through the family tree, be sure to explore the relationship chart feature: http://sankethi.ourroots.info/gedview/relationship.php With this, you can find the different relationship paths that connect any two people in the family tree. You may discover connections that you never knew existed before! Other features include descendancy charts, pedigree charts, timeline charts and other genealogically useful features.

For those of you who are curious, we are using the PhpGedView software package: http://www.phpgedview.net/ It's the leading Open Source, open standards-based genealogy software with a large number of installations worldwide. Over time, we plan to take advantage of its extensive featureset to add additional data fields (e.g. Gotra) and multimedia capabilities.



Shankaracharya: A Brief Primer

Editor's Note: This year, the NASA annual get-together will include one day focused on the life and work of Sri Adi Shankaracharya. Although there is not enough space here to describe everything about this great philosopher, we thought it would be helpful to provide some basic information.



Adi Shankaracharya was born around the 8th century in Kaladi, Kerala, under the star Thiruvaitthirai, to a childless couple who had paid homage to Lord Shiva. His father passed away when he was very young. From childhood, Shankaracharya demonstrated his intelligence and mental acuity in spiritual matters and began his path towards becoming a revered and honoured philosopher. He spread the idea of Advaita Vedanta, namely that every person is a manifestation of God and that God and Atman (the spirit) are one. This philosophy stresses the importance of understanding the holy scriptures and using personal learning to guide everyday behaviour. It is very different from other philosophical branches of Hinduism that focus on rituals, or other methods of attaining enlightenment.

Shankaracharya only lived for 32 years, but in that time he made quite an impact on India and Hinduism. He traveled extensively, engaging in debates, teaching his disciples, and creating many works, including the Manisha Panchakam, Vishnu pathati keshanta stotra, Vivekachudaamani and the Shivananda Lahari, among other hymns and discourses. He founded 4 Mathas (monastic Hindu establishments) in Sringeri

http://www.hindupedia.com/en/Sankara (Karnataka), Dwaraka (Gujarat), Puri (Orissa) and Jyotimath (Uttarkhand) to guide the Hindu religion. Today, Shankaracharya's works and his teachings on Advaita Vedanta continue to have tremendous influence on Hindus worldwide.

NASA members give back

On the Friday morning before President's Day Weekend, **Suresh Magge**, MD arrived at Children's National Medical Center in Washington, DC expecting a standard day of neurosurgery, and a relaxing, non-call holiday weekend afterwards. Little did he know that he was about to embark on a very special (and very last-minute!) journey. When a pediatric orthopaedics colleague told him that he was on his way to Haiti that day, and that their medical team needed a neurosurgeon, Suresh jumped at the opportunity. He had wanted to volunteer in Haiti but he hadn't yet found a strong, reputable organization to work with. Suresh made a few calls to re-arrange his schedule, buy a ticket and talk with family members, and within a few hours he was on his way.

When Suresh arrived in Haiti, he was reminded of India – since the rainy season was just starting it was hot and muggy during the day, temperate at night. By the time he left, the rains had started in earnest. Along with a team of about 60 doctors, Suresh made his way to Milot, a small town outside of Caphaitien, the 2nd largest city in Haiti. Milot was remarkably unaffected by the earthquake and aftershocks that devastated Port-au-Prince just about 4 weeks earlier. It was also the site of Hôpital Sacré Coeur, built in 1968 by CRUDEM (www.crudem.org), a non-profit organization that continues to support the hospital year-round. In addition to serving local patients, the hospital had opened its doors to hundreds of survivors of the Haitian earthquake. Suresh worked alongside Haitian doctors and nurses to care for the injured, setting fractures, treating infections and cleaning wounds, in addition to performing his specialty role as a neurosurgeon. Since he was the only neurosurgeon who had volunteered at the hospital, he saw adults and children with many types of neurosurgical problems (some unrelated to the quake) and also took the opportunity to train the local staff on the procedures he performed. There were many neurological conditions Suresh encountered that would normally be treated at a young age in the US, but due to lack of opportunity, care, finances etc., had not yet been addressed. Medical technology such as CT scans, x-rays and medical tests were not readily available, so Suresh found himself relying on his own medical judgment. Because supplies had to be conserved, he had to be discerning about what he would use, why and how.

Although this was Suresh's first time in Haiti, he had volunteered last year in Uganda. He felt that many of the things he had learned during his trip to Africa were applicable to the situations he faced in Haiti. For anyone considering volunteering in either a medical or non-medical capacity in Haiti or other developing areas, Suresh offered the following advice: Find a good organization that has the necessary infrastructure to support medical missions, preferably one with a solid history. At the end of his week-long stay, Suresh was exhausted, but felt that the entire experience was incredibly rewarding and would recommend medical missions to others. He came back with renewed appreciation for what he has access to each and every day in the US, but also with the memories of what he and his team were able to accomplish for some patients in need in Haiti.
